Campaign in Norwich and Norfolk





A £10,000 grant to OPA from the lottery fund financed radio adverts, posters, leaflets, bag pharmacy inserts, and other advertisements in the Norfolk area as well as google ad words adverts. Three awareness days were held at Norwich and King's Lynn.

Congratulations to Alison Chisnell who raised £1,800 for Action Against Heartburn at the London Marathon.



Be Clear on Cancer **National OG** campaign February 2015

TV and radio adverts took place in a 4-week period, supported by other posters and information in Public Health England's Be Clear on Cancer campaign, following the regional campaign in the North-East in 2014. There seems to have been a great and welcome increase in numbers associating persistent heartburn with a cancer risk, a shift towards cancer diagnoses being made on a 2week wait referral rather than at A&E, but it is not yet clear how many cases of Barrett's Oesophagus have been diagnosed as a method of preventing adenocarcinoma cases in the future.

Bethany Brown is supporting Action Against Heartburn in the New York marathon in November.

A very successful lobby and reception were held at Parliament on 13 October 2014. An Early Day Motion (no 623) was signed by 88 MPs, and an adjournment debate was introduced on 23 February 2015 by Mike Weatherley MP. The Scottish Parliament debated oesophageal cancer on 24 June.

Chaired by Tim Underwood, the Campaign's report about the picture of oesophageal cancer treatment will be published in a few weeks' time.

Point to Your Oesophagus!



Southampton surgeons and nurses supported the campaign to point to your oesophagus www.ptyo.org.uk organised by Barrett's Wessex. It is noticeable that over the last few years the public seem to be a bit less confused about where their oesophagus is! Newcastle have been undertaking awareness campaigns for longer than anyone, and have noted improvements in awareness from the general public.

Barrett's Oesophagus Campaign and UKBOR



The UK Barrett's Oesophagus Registry contains records of 12,500 patients and is the largest in the world. This research base has been invaluable in making progress on the understanding of links between persistent heartburn, Barrett's Oesophagus and adenocarcinoma, but the extra burden of requiring full patient consent for registration for this pre-cursor condition (as distinct from

cancer itself) has been acting as a significant constraint. Hopefully this decision will be relaxed in due course. The important work of UKBOR needs sustained and certain funding for the future.

NICE Guidelines

We are pleased to see that the Quality Standard 96 on Dyspepsia and GORD contains:

Statement 5: Adults with persistent, unexplained dyspepsia or reflux symptoms have a discussion with their GP about referral to a specialist service.

Unfortunately, the quality standard for referring patients for an endoscopy still maintains the criteria of suffering from dysphagia, or are aged 55 and over with weight loss. The age limit may still act as a barrier to early diagnosis for younger patients.

The NICE Guidelines for Referral for Suspected Cancer (NG12, previously CG27) have reduced the threshold of suspicion for specialist referral, but were not willing to consider non-malignant precursor conditions like Barrett's Oesophagus. They worked on the positive predictive value of records created from GP surgery presentations.


The report gives welcome emphasis to the importance of early diagnosis and unlocking blockages to specialist diagnostic facilities.

Cancer Research UK are also organising a petition to the Chancellor, George Osborne, asking for a significant increase in investment in equipment and staff for *Test Cancer Sooner*. In the case of oesophageal cancer this would
